Linda and I lost our spouses to death several years ago, but long before that I was acquainted with the Crouch family, dating back to 1954. The Crouch family's great love for the work of the Lord is well-known. In fact, brother and sister Crouch have supported me (and dozens

Brother Crouch came from a very humble farm family back-

ground, but managed to rise from that difficult beginning to become acquainted with some of

the most prominent men in Texas. Brother Crouch worked for 28 years as a Certified Public Accountant in San Antonio, TX. He then worked for 28 years for banker and rancher, Governor Dolph Briscoe, and was a close friend of the governor. He moved to Uvalde, TX, as senior vice president and trust officer at First State Bank of Uvalde, and was a member of the bank board, retiring in 2002.

As a young man, before brother Crouch was a member of the church, he entered the armed services in the early 1940s (during World War II) and beginning as a private, first class, soon rose to the highest position possible for the office he held in the armed services. He lived and worked on an air base in Texas throughout the entire war.

Brother Crouch established the Nacogdoches Road church of Christ in San Antonio, TX, in

the 1950s and was a leader there until the 1990s. Brother Crouch was married for 59 years to his wife. Marjorie, who is now living in an independent living establishment in Arlington, Texas, being 90 years old. Sister Crouch is one of the most intelligent, pious, and

remarkable women I have ever met. She is still active and her mind remains strong. Her love for the church is as great as that of her husband.

Linda and I arrived back in Malawi on January 25th, where we were met at the Lilongwe airport by our co-workers and friends, Doug and Debbie Edwards and Bill and Daisy Davis. We had a joyous reunion and all overnighted in Lilongwe, they turning south the next morning to Blantyre (200 miles away) and we north to Mzuzu (225 miles away). Thus, our work now continues in Malawi.

We send our sincere thanks to everyone for their expressions of sympathy in this difficult time for the family. The love and kindnesses expressed to us while in America are beyond words.

I am beginning to understand, in a small way of course, how Noah must have felt after a month of solid rain. I am writing this on January 31st and it has rained almost every day this month. Each day brings a different shower. One day we had 3 inches, and other days we have had much smaller amounts. According to our rain gauge we have received over 22 inches this month. That does not include November and December's totals. It has certainly caused all of the vegetation to spring to life. Malawi is so beautiful and green during the rainy season. It is a shame the rains could not be spread out over the year.

Staying close to home has allowed me to spend time with the Blantyre congregation. Blantyre has a nice group of Christians and good leadership. I have been studying with the leaders on Saturday morning and then preaching on Sunday. Our theme for this short work is "Building a mature congregation." I hope to encourage the brethren to work within the local congregation to make it stronger.

One of the projects that I finished this month was a brief concordance of the Chichewa Bible. When I say brief, I mean very brief. The brethren here have no refer-

ence works. There are no Strong's or W.E. Vine's translated into Chichewa. So I picked out about 150 Biblical words that I think are important and then located about 10 Scriptures for each word. I have now passed the project over to Lester Kasambwe for him to translate. I imagine that there are going to be some difficulties in trying to go from one language to another. Lester will have to

look up each Scripture to make sure that the word is contained in that Scripture. Sometimes

Chichewa uses more than one word to describe an English word. That may present a problem with some of the Scriptures that I have chosen. This is a project that can be continued in the future. More Scriptures can be added to the words and more words can be added as well. I plan to spend a little time during each study this year explaining how to use a concordance.

Linda and Jerry arrived back in Malawi last Friday. They had flown out of Blantyre, leaving their vehicle with us. They flew into Lilongwe so we took their truck there to meet them. Bill and Daisy went with us as Bill needed to visit the American Embassy in Lilongwe and get more pages for his passport. We spent the night together at a rest house and had a very enjoyable time. It is always good to see fellow Americans.

I must tell one on myself though. Lilongwe is fours away from Blantyre. When we were about an hour out of Lilongwe it suddenly hit me that I had left one of the Cutter's suitcases back in Blantyre. Of course it was the one full of financial and other important



records. So I had to transfer Bill over to the vehicle the ladies were driving and head back to Blantyre. My leisurely 4 hour

trip suddenly turned into a 10 hour Nascar trip. I would love to blame it all on Debbie and say
